# **COVER ART**



This month's cover was created by Elena Flerova.

The works of internationally honoured artist Elena Flerova range from remarkably insightful portraits that capture the spirit of her subjects to large-scale monoprint paintings and oils. They also include wall murals, screens and other interior decoration for private residences and public buildings. All of them evoke the mystique, essence and sweep of historical and religious events and fables.

Born in Moscow in 1943, Elena graduated with honours from the prestigious Surikov Fine Arts Institute in 1969. Her top graduate standing won her a scholarship to the

National Academy of Fine Arts, an exclusive school admitting only a limited number of exceptionally gifted artists. Both institutions assisted Elena in maturing her talent and establishing authentic academic skills. Combined with her inherent ability to create sophisticated compositions, these skills empowered Elena to devise unique artwork.

The avenue in which the artist uses light and shadow, colour and composition equates her with old European masters. All these properties are efficiently used for conveying both mood and movement in her paintings. At the same time, her exceptional mastery in providing the presence of vibrating air illumination relates her with impressionists that are more recent.

The artist refrains from any preparatory sketches and starts working directly with brush and canvas. This freedom distinguishes her from the majority of contemporary realists working in a less dynamic manner. Elena is a master monoprint painter as well as an award-winning book and magazine illustrator, watercolourist and etcher.

In the tradition of old masters, and unlike typical monoprint artists, Elena forges jeweler-like results by refining her work following the transfer. Meticulous details sharpened by intense colour and provocative lighting create masterful three-dimensional illusion.

Over the course of her professional career, Elena has had numerous oneperson shows in Europe and North America. Her works have been shown in more than 80 national and international exhibitions and won numerous awards and honors.

Paintings by Elena Flerova are held in many private collections in the United States and abroad.

I'm sure many of you have similar memories about how Bonnie's advice proved helpful. If you would like to share them in this bulletin, we would be thrilled to publish them. I'm sure that a common theme would run through the tales, as Bonnie truly loved helping people.

It was her involvement in Forestdale Heights Lodge where most of us got to know our late past president.

I remember sitting around the table at 15 Hove years back when it was strange to have a female presence at a meeting.

Today few could imagine our Lodge without the mix of men and women at a meeting.

Yet it began by a simple challenge (one that Bonnie simply could not pass up) made by a former member. He had threatened to leave if women joined the Lodge.

Never one to back away from a challenge, Bonnie

immediately signed up. The rest, as they say, is commentary.

However, Bonnie did not just become a member, but became involved in every facet of the Lodge, starting at the committee level and rising through the executive ranks. Finally, it was her turn to shine as the Lodge's president and shine she did; ensuring FHL remained a leader among B'nai Brith Canada lodges.

In the process, our first female president became the first **person** in the history of Forestdale Heights to serve three consecutive terms.

In the months following her diagnosis with cancer, Bonnie's involvement with Forestdale Heights did not diminish. She remained active in every aspect of the Lodge, attending one social event, while planning another at Woodbine. When asked how she was dealing with it all, she simply said, "I'm hanging in there."

It should not have been a surprise though. That's how she operated over the years. Despite an often-hectic work schedule and busy family life, she felt that if you wanted something done, you gave it to a busy person.

She certainly stepped up to the plate years ago when I put out a request for writers for our Lodge bulletin. The result was "As I See It," in which she shared the joys and pains of her life. Well, "As I See It," she certainly made doing the bulletin interesting and challenging every month. Not only did Bonnie write a column, but also shared her views on every aspect and every page that we put out every month. Most of the time, I agreed with her, but others we would simply agree to disagree on a column or submission.

As technology changed the way the bulletin is created, so did our methods of collaborating. In the past few years, I would e-mail the final product to her and we would hookup online to read over every page. The result is that we would catch

mistakes that we both missed reading it on our own.

For the past few months as her illness progressed, these special times become a thing of the past. Proofing the bulletin now, I often find myself thinking about what Bonnie would think of a certain addition or change.

She constantly pushed and challenged me to make the bulletin the best it could. While I was the technical wiz, she was the lay expert, offering her view of the final product.

It was over a year ago she did just that, telling me that our covers had become boring and suggested we start using Jewish art. I was initially hesitant and doubted it would work, but she kept pushing the idea. In the end, it proved a huge success.

The bulletin has and always will be a labour of love, one that is created "with a little help from my friends." I consider myself lucky to have been able to include Bonnie in this special circle.

To our great sadness, Bonnie is no longer here to dole out her advice or share a joke. However, I know her ideals and dreams will live on through Michael and in her sons Marc and Lonny.

Bonnie Kates was so many things....a wife, mother and a true game changer who altered our Lodge for the better.

However, for me, she was simply...a great friend.

Goodbye Bonnie.

I could go on for pages about the good times we shared as families in and out of the Lodge. In fact, to this very day, my kids still believe that Bonnie is the tooth fairy.

Beyond the good times, there is both Bonnie and Michael, who between them held the presidency for over half a decade. Bonnie served as a strong leader during some turbulent times. Both deserve full credit for the survival of our Lodge, by being courageous and by being visionaries who saw the big picture beyond the squabbling that was taking place at that time. Bonnie made good things happen.

Mere words cannot really describe both my personal loss and the large void in the Lodge that now exists with her passing. I am glad to have had both the pleasure and honour of calling her both a friend and a fellow Forestdalenik for all too short a time.

# **CHANUKAH TREATS**

#### Low-Fat Potato Latkes II

- 1 pound Idaho or russet potatoes, scrubbed but not peeled
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 3 large egg whites
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- Non-stick vegetable oil cooking spray
- 3 to 4 tablespoons olive oil (not extra-virgin) or vegetable oil



Preheat the oven to 350° F. Grate the potatoes using a box grater or the grating disk of a food processor. Transfer the potatoes to a colander over a bowl and let rest for 30 minutes, until the potatoes have darkened. Rinse well in cold water to remove the starch and the potatoes turn white again. Drain very well. Place the potatoes, onion, egg whites, seasonings and flour in a medium bowl. Stir well to combine. Cover with plastic wrap and let sit for 15 minutes before cooking. Spray a baking sheet with non-stick cooking spray; set aside.

Heat 2 tablespoons of the olive oil in a large, non-stick skillet over medium heat until very hot. Stir the potato mixture and, working in batches if necessary, drop the potato mixture by spoonfuls onto the hot skillet and shape them into circles.

Let the latkes brown on one side, and then turn them over to brown on other side. Place the browned pancakes on a cookie sheet that has been sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. When the tray is full, bake the latkes, uncovered, for another 10 to 15 minutes until the potatoes are cooked through. Place on paper towels to absorb any fat and eat them while they're hot, with regular, low-fat or non-fat sour cream and regular or sugar-free applesauce, if desired.

Makes about 16 to 18 latkes.

Note: The trick to making these pancakes lower in fat is to use a skillet with a non-stick surface and to finish them in the oven. Serve with low-fat or non-fat sour cream and sugar-free applesauce.

# **HEALTH IN HARMONY**




I dedicate this column about Holocaust Education Week to Bonnie Kates, (ala sholom) for she was so involved in the Jewish causes throughout her life, to uplift the Jewish

people. She always will remain in our hearts.

I was able to partake in some

Holocaust Education Week events and gained a new perspective on the terrible deeds that were inflicted on Jews and others during World War II. I heard a personal account from Sonia Rosen at the



Mrs. Rosen spoke eloquently about her terrible trials as a child of the Holocaust, and how she survived this horrific ordeal. She could never understand why this tragedy was happening; her parents were simple, kind people and to this day can't figure out why they were targeted. Her main message was of tolerance to others, that we're all the same and hate shouldn't be practiced on any group of people. She told the children in attendance that if they don't like someone they should simply walk away. Practicing hate, she said, can lead to terrible deeds. She also spoke of the lies that are currently being told

regarding Holocaust denial. The audience, including the children, was visibly moved.

I also attended a talk at Baycrest Hospital where officials at Crestwood School (a private school), spent five years interviewing Holocaust survivors at Baycrest. They


videotaped interviews with 10 survivors about their own experiences during the Holocaust and the horrors they witnessed. people Over 90 attended, including many of the survivors who had been videotaped. Again, their message was to practice tolerance. They encouraged others to learn from their experiences and not to let this happen to Jews or any other people again.

This is a message for all of us to take into our hearts – practice tolerance.


