being a young, single woman to a stepmother to four children, the oldest who was just five years younger than she was. How did she do it, you may ask. I guess that will remain her secret. At her funeral, one of her stepchildren – all of whom attended with their families – praised her as a role model and friend who they grew to love and admire over the years.

Surprisingly, she did not just draw her stepchildren into her sphere of life. She insisted that her husband's former spouse be included in family and holiday celebrations. Her reasoning was that the children needed their biological mother. I'm sure this woman found it bizarre in the early years, but from what I learned, over time, the two women developed a friendship and came to regard each other as sisters. **Continued on next page**

My cousin provided this wrong, finding an amazing second companion when she was 48, one with whom she shared her life with for almost the past two decades. Together they travelled the globe, meeting with and befriending strangers and "boldly going" where she had not gone before.

Unfortunately, some years ago she crossed paths with something a little less friendly. Fortunately, she won round one in her fight against cancer. Remission allowed her to continue to "live, laugh and love." Regrettably, it eventually re-entered her life, this time with a vengeance.

As her time drew to a close, we were told that she accepted it with grace, saying that she had done what she wanted to do, that she had lived her life to the fullest and had no regrets.

In the end, isn't that what life's all about? We all know that no matter how precious, our lives will someday end. Some choose to stop living at a certain point and wait for the inevitable conclusion. Others simply pause along the road of life, look to the left, look to the right and plow forward with life...to their final day.

As we prepare to usher in 5777, I would like to wish *everyone L'Shanah Tovah U'Metukah*, A Sweet and Happy New Year. May you enjoy good health and may you continue to enjoy life to the fullest.

Williamstown was first settled in 1749 (the same year as Halifax, Nova Scotia, where I was born) and was named after Col. Ephraim Williams. It was originally called West Hoosac. The primary industry is agriculture, specifically dairy farming, sheep herding and wool production. We are counting down to our 50th anniversary celebration in June 2017. 1988 – FHL Presidents: Al Reider/Michael Kates Prime Minister Brian Mulrony; Ontario Premier David Peterson

January 15 – In Jerusalem, Israeli police and Palestinian protestors clash at the Dome of the Rock; several police and at least 70 Palestinians are injured.



January 26 – The Phantom of the Opera, the longest running Broadway play ever, opens.

January 28 – Canada's abortion laws are repealed by the Supreme Court. February 29 – A Nazi document implicates Kurt Waldheim in World War

II deportations.

March 24 – An Israeli court sentences Mordechai Vanunu to 18 years in prison for disclosing Israel's nuclear program to The Sunday Times.

April 16 – Israeli commandos kill the PLO's Abu Jihad in Tunisia.

April 25 – In Israel, Ivan Demjanjuk is sentenced to death for war crimes committed in World War II. He is accused by survivors of being the notorious guard at the Treblinka extermination camp known as "Ivan the Terrible." The conviction is later overturned by the Israeli Supreme Court.

August 11 – Al-Qaeda is formed by Osama bin Laden.

September 29 – STS-26: NASA resumes Space Shuttle flights, grounded after the Challenger disaster, with Space Shuttle Discovery.

November 1 – In the Israeli election, Likud wins 47 seats, Labour wins 49, but Likud Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir remains in office.

November 8 – United States presidential election, 1988: George H. W. Bush is elected over Michael Dukakis, becoming the first sitting Vice President of the United States in 152 years to be elected as President of the United States.

November 15 – Israeli–Palestinian conflict: An independent State of Palestine is proclaimed at the Palestinian National Council meeting in Algiers, by a vote of 253–46.

November 21 – Canadian federal election, Brian Mulroney and the Progressive Conservative Party of Canada win a second majority government.

"Well, David, it's a memorial to all the young men and women who died in the service."



We learned of the Jerusalem High Speed Link, currently under construction, connecting Tel Aviv to Jerusalem in just a travel time of 30 minutes.

• En francais, s'il vous plait. While Hebrew is spoken everywhere in Israel, the proliferation of French being spoken on the streets truly shocked us. The recent attacks and anti-Semitism in France has been the impetus for thousands of French Jews to make *aliyah*. Unlike their Russian brethren, French Jews are finding it extraordinarily difficult to acclimate to their new surroundings.

Tel Avivians pride themselves on being anti-religious.
